February 28th - March 15th 2023

Eager to start travelling again we signed up for a 14-day 'Birds of the Isthmus of Panama' tour with Birding Panama (www.birdingpanama.com)—covering Central Panama, the Chiriquí Highlands and an optional extension to the Darién lowlands—which was attractively priced at US\$2795 per person all in. This trip report also includes our notes on a one-day pre-tour extension to the Cerro Azul region, undertaken by Andrew & Ann Duff only. We were pleased with 386 species of birds recorded, of which 82 were lifers, including our prime target of Harpy Eagle; 14 of these species were heard only. 14 species of mammals and 17 species of butterflies were also recorded.

GENERAL INFORMATION

Flights International return flights with AirFrance/KLM from London to Panama City via Paris/Amsterdam cost £683 per person inclusive of all taxes. In Panama we had one internal return flight, from Panama City to David (Chiriquí), included in the tour price.

Guides We arrived in Panama two days early and arranged to have a full day's guided birding in the Cerro Azul region, with an excellent guide Nicasio Rodriguez ("Moyo", roddiaz22.75@gmail.com). For the main tour our guide was Domiciano Alveo ("Domi", domi0502@gmail.com), who was also first-rate. Both of our guides were provided by Birding Panama.

Transport in Panama For eight participants and a guide we had a 12-seater minibus with driver.

Accommodation Mostly good to very good hotels apart from the hotel in Meteti which was fairly basic although it did have a/c and hot water. Only the Summit Rainforest & Golf Resort served breakfast at a suitable time, starting at 06:30, and they provided us with a good box breakfast on our early 05:45 start on the morning before the tour began. Elsewhere we used local cafes which sometimes meant a later start than we would normally anticipate.

Summit Rainforest & Golf Resort, Panama City - 3 nights at the start and 1 at the end of the tour Hostel Casa Grimaldo, El Valle - 2 nights Hotel Dos Ríos, Volcán, Chiriquí Highlands - 3 nights Riande Airport Hotel, Panama City - 1 night Hotel Portal Avicar, Tortí - 1 night Hospedaje Aruba, Meteti - 2 nights

Food and drink Generally good: *Breakfast*: usually fresh fruit followed by scrambled eggs. *Lunch*: provided in various restaurants or cafes en route. *Dinner*: plentiful quantity with a free choice from the menu. *Drinks*: bottled water was provided throughout with juices or sodas with meals.

Currency US\$ are the currency with coins denominated either in cents or Panamanian balboas which are tied to the US\$ at an exchange rate of 1:1.

Health Anti-malarial prophylaxis was not necessary at the time of year we were there and in fact there were few irritating insects. Yellow fever certificates are not compulsory nor were we asked for proof of Covid vaccinations.

Time zone Panama is 5 hours behind GMT.

Weather Overall we were lucky, enjoying mostly sunny skies, and only losing little birding time due to strong winds and showers in El Valle.

Field guides For birds we relied on Vallely & Dyer *Birds of Central America* (Princeton University Press, 2018) as we preferred the plates and taxonomic treatment to Angehr & Dean *The Birds of Panama: a field guide* (Cornell University Press, 2011) which was used by others in the group. For mammals we used Reid *A Field Guide to the Mammals of Central America and Southeast Mexico* (Oxford University Press, 1997). For butterflies we used Glassberg *A Swift Guide to Butterflies of Mexico and Central America* (Princeton University Press, 2nd edn. 2017).

DAILY DIARY

Feb 28th - International travel day

09:00 Air France flight from London Heathrow to Panama City via Paris arriving at 19:30 local time. Met by Jose Carlos Garcia, co-founder of Birding Panama, for transfer to the Summit Rainforest & Golf Resort.

March 1st - Summit Rainforest & Golf Resort

A relaxing day around the extensive grounds of the hotel to reacquaint ourselves with some of the more common species. There was a large movement of raptors and vultures which we could watch from our fifth-floor balcony. Our room overlooked some feeding stations which had recently been replenished with fresh fruit and were attracting Collared Araçari, Whooping Motmot and Buff-throated Saltator, with Central American Agouti and White-nosed Coati also enjoying the feast. Best birds on a short walk were a pair of Dusky Antbirds very close to the Butterfly House.

March 2nd - Cerro Azul & Cerro Jefe (Chagres NP)

We had booked a guide through Birding Panama to take us to Cerro Azul as this seemed to be the best place to find two of the Panamanian endemic birds: Stripe-cheeked Woodpecker and Yellowgreen Tyrannulet. Our guide, "Moyo", collected us at 06:00 for the 45 min. drive across the city. We were surprised to find that the Cerro Azul area comprised lots of chicken farms and other agricultural enterprises with many houses and many more being built. Moyo knew the area well and chose a gulley outside the Finca Altair to try for the Yellow-green Tyrannulet which duly obliged. We spent some time around the Cascada El Vigia where we encountered a large flock of Carmiol's Tanagers before heading to Cerro Jefe for Mistletoe Tyrannulet. We searched for properties with hummingbird feeders but the wind had picked up and those we found had very few birds so we returned to Cerro Azul where a roadside stop produced White-ruffed Manakin and Stripe-cheeked Woodpecker. With our targets achieved we headed back towards the town of 24 de Diciembre, pausing en route at Cerro Azul lake for Band-rumped Swift, before stopping at a very busy typical buffet-style restaurant for an excellent and inexpensive lunch. Our day wasn't over and Moyo took us to the Summit Ponds, quite close to our hotel, where we added three species of kingfisher and two more new birds: Scarlet-rumped and Black-tailed Caciques. Time to return to the hotel and meet our fellow travellers for the next 14 days, discovering that we were all much of the same age, i.e. close to or over 70 with one participant of 87!!

March 3rd - Ammo Dump Ponds, Pipeline Road, Summit Ponds

The hotel began serving breakfast at 06:30 so no early start. At 07:00 we met our guide, Domi, and our driver, Francisco, in the hotel foyer then drove the short distance to Ammo Dump Ponds which are near Gamboa alongside the Panama Canal. Rufescent Tiger Heron was one of the first birds to be seen and it was good to be reacquainted with this species but for Andrew and me the main objective was White-throated Crake which had eluded us on too many occasions - and it did so again, only being heard. Notable sightings included Grey-lined and Crane Hawks, Yellow-throated Toucan and one Cliff Swallow. We spent some time at the start of the Pipeline Road where I was pleased to find another Dusky Antbird before we set off towards Semaphore Hill. Soon it was difficult to keep up as the sightings were coming fast so we tried to concentrate on those species new to us: Shining Honeycreeper, Black-breasted Puffbird, Song Wren, Fasciated Antshrike and Streak-chested Antpitta, also our first Mantled Howler Monkey. As the morning wore on the trail became very busy with coachloads of tourists heading down to the Rainforest Discovery Center so we were pleased to head off to lunch and a siesta before going to Summit Ponds in the mid-afternoon where we added Lesser Kiskadee and Grey-headed Chachalaca to the list. However the best species there wasn't a bird but a mammal: a Brown-throated Three-toed Sloth. That evening after dinner we walked down to the small pond at the end of the hotel driveway to add Lesser Capybara to our list. To our surprise we saw eyes gleaming from the well-maintained golf course and found they belonged to Pauraques.

March 4th - Metropolitan Natural Park, Albrook Ponds, Pipeline Road

After our 06:30 breakfast we drove to the Metropolitan Natural Park in Panama City which yielded a range of mainly flycatchers and tyrannulets but also Lance-tailed Manakin, Yellow-backed Oriole, Plain-brown Woodcreeper and Rosy Thrush-Tanager was heard but refused to show itself. Highlight was the engaging Geoffroy's Tamarins who responded to Domi's calls and came very close. We continued on to Albrook Ponds, opposite St Mary's College, where a large Common Basilisk lizard performed nicely by running on water. We had good views of a pair of Buff-breasted Wrens and a range of American wood-warblers but only a Yellow-green Greenlet was new for us. A heavy shower

prompted an early lunch at Niko's (a chain of buffet-style restaurants with a wide choice of tasty dishes) followed by a siesta before returning to an oddly quiet (birdwise) Pipeline Road. The main highlight was a pair of Southern Mealy Amazons, a new bird for us.

March 5th - Ammo Dump Ponds, Pipeline Road, drive to El Valle, Cerro Cara Iguana trail

Awoke this morning to see a party of Geoffroy's Tamarins outside our bedroom windows - so cute! Back to Ammo Dump Ponds where a White-throated Crake adult showed very well along with a couple of black fluffy chicks - result! We drove down the Pipeline Road as far as the Rainforest Discovery Center, where a Purple-throated Fruitcrow was briefly seen, then continued walking across the bridge where another very difficult bird was heard and responded to playback: Greenand-rufous Kingfisher - excellent. It turned out to be a very productive morning with Panama Flycatcher, Spotted Antbird, Moustached Antwren, Blue Cotinga, Lesser Pied Puffbird, Rufous Mourner and female Blue Cotinga. Then back to the city and Niko's for lunch before driving to El Valle for two nights. However, our birding for the day wasn't over as we were taken to a private site in El Valle to view an adult and a juvenile Spectacled Owl at their daytime roost site. We then walked for a short time on the Cerro Cara Iguana trail, seeing Yellow-crowned Euphonia, Long-billed Starthroat and Snowy-bellied Hummingbird. A high wind made birding difficult so we returned to the hotel before going to a local restaurant for dinner.

March 6th - El Valle area

It was still very windy when we finally emerged from our draughty bedroom to enjoy a good breakfast of fresh fruit and scrambled eggs with ham and cheese. We drove to La Mesa to spend an hour and a half at feeders organised by a local man, Manuel. Euphonias, tanagers, saltators, etc., were feasting on the fruit Manuel put out for them. Most notable were: Tawny-capped Euphonia, Black-headed Saltator and Lesser Elaenia. We drove higher on the Las Minas road to the sendero mirador (lookout path) at Mundo Perdido (lost world) and the Candelario Trail which produced

Bronze-tailed Plumeleteer, Golden-collared Manakin, Tawny-crested Tanager and a Jaguarundi which Andrew and I missed because we were looking at a butterfly! Big dip! We visited another trail into the forest where we waited patiently close to a flowering heliconia until a White-tipped Sicklebill flew in. It was still very windy and there was a hint of rain so as it was lunchtime we returned to El Valle for food and a siesta. Later we drove to Altos del Maria with the weather still windy and overcast but the Watercress Trail turned up trumps with an unexpected Slate-colored Seedeater, an uncommon and often elusive bird which is difficult to catch up with. Some last minute birding around town produced Crested Oropendola, Barred Antshrike and Lineated Woodpecker.

March 7th - travel day: from El Valle drive to Panama City, flight to David, drive to Volcán

A late breakfast at 07:00, packed our bags and we were away by 07:50 to drive back to Panama City for our afternoon flight to David. We paused on the way at El Valle lookout where there were many American wood-warblers and a brief fly-past by a distant Scaled Pigeon, a bird we keep missing. En route we saw our only Grey-cowled Wood-rail of the trip as a pair attempted to cross the road. We made good time back to Panama City so stopped off at the Amador Causeway alongside the canal to add a few pelicans, gulls, terns and shorebirds to the list. Our flight for David left 30 minutes late which led to an interesting situation where we tried to land at the same time as another plane and the pilot had to quickly abort. As if that wasn't enough, after landing we had to wait whilst an animal was removed from the runway before we could taxi to the gate. Our driver collected us for the transfer to Volcán where we eventually had dinner at the Dos Ríos Hotel at 20:45.

March 8th - Volcán area

The hotel didn't serve an early breakfast so at 06:30 we were driven to Ely's cafe in town for scrambled eggs and toast before continuing to the start of the Los Quetzales trail in Volcán Baru NP. We spent the first part of the morning watching Mr Flores's feeders which were absolutely buzzing with hummingbirds and flowerpiercers, etc. Stars of the show were: Scintillant Hummingbird, Talamanca Hummingbird, Green (Lesser) Violetear, White-throated Mountain-gem, Violet Sabrewing, Black Guan and a female Resplendent Quetzal. The male was waiting for us a little further up the road although we never got much further than the park entrance where we were kept busy with Ochraceous Wren, Volcano Hummingbird, Long-tailed Silky-flycatcher, Mistletoe Tyrannulet and Chestnut-capped Brush-finch. After lunch we drove towards Lagunas de Volcán although we were dropped off to walk part of the way as there was good roadside birding to be had including White-tailed Emerald, a new bird for us. At the lakes we found Cherrie's (Flame-rumped) Tanager, the highly localised near-endemic Chiriqui (Masked) Yellowthroat and both Slaty and Palebreasted Spinetails.

March 9th - Cerro Punta area, La Amistad NP, Volcán

An earlier start today as we were going to La Amistad NP so breakfast at Ely's at 06:15 and, although everything was ready for us, we didn't get away until 07:00 - not really much of an early start! But first we headed towards Cerro Punta, stopping at Altos Pineda for an obliging Costa Rican Pygmy-Owl along with Blue-throated Toucanet and Scintillant Hummingbird. Both Dark Pewee and Silverythroated Tapaculo were heard but not responsive. We arrived at the Las Nubes Forest Station in La Amistad NP but were unable to drive up to the visitor center as the road was being repaired. This turned out just fine as on the walk up we encountered a gorgeous Flame-throated Warbler, Prongbilled Barbet, Dark Pewee and heard another unobliging Silvery-throated Tapaculo. At the top of the road we heard, then saw, a Black-faced Solitaire before walking the only trail open, the Loop Trail which enters some old forest. Wow! So many new birds: Collared Whitestart (Redstart), Spanglecheeked Tanager, Ruddy Treerunner, Black-cheeked Warbler, Spotted Barbtail, Yellow-winged Vireo, Sooty-capped Brush-finch and two shy Wrenthrushes which gave fantastic views. After so much excitement we needed lunch and this proved to add even more great birding. Our lunch stop was at the Tamanadua Hummingbird Garden (\$10 entrance fee) where we sat and enjoyed watching the hectic activity at the feeders while lunch was prepared. Fiery-throated Hummingbird was a fitting end to a great morning. We arrived back in Volcán quite late in the afternoon and after a short break we headed across the road from the hotel to a pond where we were delighted to find Scarletthighed Dacnis, yet another new bird for us. In the hotel grounds we found Black Phoebe, Roadside Hawk and Melodious Blackbird before it was time for dinner.

March 10th - Paraíso area, Cascada Macho de Monte, flight from David to Panama City

We actually managed an early start today leaving the hotel at 06:35 for the drive to Paraíso and breakfast at Birding Paradise. We spent the whole morning enjoying the birds at the feeders and walking around the extensive grounds. Mishael Rivera has done a fantastic job in transforming what was pasture into an amazing bird-filled paradise. It was difficult to tear ourselves away from the feeders to enjoy the delicious breakfast and, later, lunch. New birds for us included: Scaly-breasted Hummimngbird, Garden Emerald (nest-building), Blue-throated Goldentail, Spot-crowned Euphonia, Crimson-fronted Parakeet and Orange-collared Manakin. A new bird for the grounds was a Hook-billed Kite, taking the number of bird species seen there to 371. Dragging ourselves away to catch our flight back to Panama City, on the way back to David we found time to stop at Cascada Macho de Monte ("Tapir Falls") to catch up with a Charming Hummingbird on the roadside. This evening we bade farewell to Susanne who would not be joining the post-tour extension to the Darién lowlands.

March 11th - travel day: Panama City to Tortí

Francisco collected us from the hotel and we were away by 07:30 for the long, bumpy ride to the Darién region. The words "Pan American Highway" conjure up a fast dual-carriageway - it isn't! The further east we went the worse the road surface became, until we reached Darién Province when it suddenly improved immeasurably. En route we stopped at Bayano Lake to stretch our legs and add a few water birds such as Cocoi Heron and our only Red-rumped Woodpecker of the tour. We didn't stay long as it was quite smoky from a roadside grass fire. A roadside stop near a bridge yielded Rufous-breasted Hermit and Gartered Trogon. On arriving in Tortí we drove immediately to Tortí Arriba ("Tortí Heights") for a quick recce before checking in to the Hotel Portal Avicar where we watched the tanager and hummingbird feeders while waiting for lunch. After lunch we drove to the

Río Tortí where the highlights were Grey-lined Hawk, Grey-cheeked Nunlet, Red-lored Parrot, Black Antshrike, Cinnamon and One-colored Becards.

March 12th - Tortí area, drive to Meteti, El Salto road

Next morning, while sitting with Domi, Andrew and I saw a pair of Sapphire-throated Hummingbirds at one of the feeders before the others arrived for breakfast - and before the resident Snowy-bellied Hummingbird was on guard duty! We returned to Tortí Arriba where the locals were filling large tanks with water from the river. There had been a fire on the hillside where Domi had expected to hear antbirds, etc., and although we did hear a Jet Antbird it was too far away to respond. However we did see a Great Antshrike, a pair of Pacific Antwrens and the only Blue Ground-Dove of the tour. We also had great views of Mantled Howler Monkeys (with the alpha male in full voice) and a Hoffmann's Two-toed Sloth. Driving back to the Río Tortí a Savannah Hawk and Red-breasted Meadowlark were seen. Once at the river Andrew and I were delighted when Domi spotted two Green Ibises perched up not far away - yet another new bird! Barred Puffbird was also new for the list. After lunch we continued the long drive to the Darién, arriving in Meteti in time to check in to our hotel then drive on to the start of the El Salto road where roadside birding produced Whiteheaded Wren, Spot-crowned Barbet, Orange-crowned Oriole and a fly-over Wood Stork. At dinner we selected a few pastries to have for breakfast tomorrow - a BIG day of the tour!



March 13th - drive to Río Tuira, boat to La Marea (Harpy Eagle), Lajas Blancas, Meteti

Today was Harpy Eagle day and we were all apprehensive. We intended to get away by 05:10 but were slightly delayed as we needed to collect coffees (for those who can't function without it!) plus some sandwiches from a local cafe for lunch as we could possibly be at La Marea all day, depending on whether the adult Harpy Eagle returned to the nest. Our boat was waiting for us at the river bank on the wide Río Tuira and soon we were zipping along the river before turning on to the narrow Río Marea, a tributary that took us to the indigenous community of La Marea, in all a journey of about

an hour. It was high tide and we hoped to see the eagles before the tide turned as it would mean waiting most of the day otherwise. As we climbed out of the boat Kit scraped her shin which bled profusely. Luckily Dorothy had antiseptic wipes and I had wadding and plasters and Domi used a clean T-shirt to wipe away the blood. Kit gamely carried on to the reception area where we sat on benches under the shade to eat a quick breakfast. The villagers of La Marea have done a wonderful job of making the climb to the viewpoint easier by hacking steps and lining them with concrete blocks and providing a rope handrail to haul oneself up. Out of breath, we admired the sight of the 10-month-old chick in the huge nest. Above and right of the nest was an adult, the female we were told. We peered through the camouflage netting and watched the youngster stretch its wings and try a few leaps up and down. We were led, one by one, to a side trail where we could quietly admire the adult without the obstruction of branches. It was such a privilege to see this majestic bird but, mindful of the tides, we reluctantly had to make our way back to the boat. Amongst other birds seen were: Blue-and-yellow Macaw, Black Oropendola, a male Blue Cotinga, Brownish Twistwing, Chestnut-backed Antbird and Great Jacamar. The return journey was uneventful and we were able to eat our sandwiches once we got back to the vehicle. On the way back to Meteti we drove to the riverside community of Lajas Blancas which was a bit of a let-down after La Marea. A refugee camp at the site had spilled out from where Domi had last seen it and our birding was hampered by a couple of small boys, harmless but a nuisance, so we soon moved on. On the way back to the main road we were delighted to see a perched Pearl Kite, a bird we had seen badly in Colombia some years ago. After dinner in Meteti some of us tried a little night birding just a short drive outside the town; we heard a Little Tinamou and saw Tropical Screech-Owl, Pauraque and a Southern Opossum.

March 14th - El Salto road, drive back to Panama City

The final day of the tour saw us return to El Salto road where a Crested Eagle had recently been seen, but sadly not by us. However, another male Blue Cotinga, Long-tailed Tyrant, Black-cheeked Woodpecker, Black-crowned Antshrike, King Vulture, a flock of Scaled Plgeons and, after a great deal of persistence on Domi's part, two Double-banded Greytails. Then it was time to collect our bags and head back to Panama City with a break for lunch watching the feeders at Hotel Portal Avicar in Tortí. We eventually checked in to the Summit Rainforest & Golf Resort again as we all had flights home the next day. We said farewell to Domi, who had been a great guide, and to Francisco for not just his driving, but for his ability to spot birds whilst driving.

March 15th - Summit Rainforest & Golf Resort, international flights

Andrew and I didn't need to be at the airport until late afternoon so we were up early to check out the hotel grounds. The male Dusky Antbird was still in the same area close to the Butterfly House but as we walked along the path and turned right at the top by the golf course we heard a call which Andrew thought might be a different antbird. After quite some time trying to call it out, we were eventually rewarded with great views of Black-faced Antthrush, our last new bird of the tour and a fitting end. Our international flight was with KLM to London via Amsterdam, a much more comfortable flight than with Air France owing to less cramped seating.

March 16th - arrival home

We landed in Amsterdam on time and were surprised to find that we had to go through a security check before we could reach our transfer gate. We were told this was because the security on departure from some countries wasn't always as strict as the checks at Amsterdam's Schiphol Airport. Our connection to London Heathrow was on time and although there was a long queue at immigration it was moving fast. We collected our car from the Renaissance Hotel (recommended for an overnight stay before the outbound flight and for parking whilst away) then just the drive home to Norfolk.
